


MESSAGE FROM **THE CHIEF**

NEIGHBORHOOD PATROL UNIT

PATROL HIGHLIGHT NORTH DIVISION

Members of the Bravo Bravo Midnight squad have been working diligently to combat criminal activity in their assigned area. The officers utilize the crime center cameras and analysts, unmarked vehicles, foot patrol, and squad teamwork to identify criminal activity and arrest those involved.

To help detectives solve crimes, our crime center investigators stay up to date on the newest forensics methods. Recently, a Bloodstain Pattern Analysis workshop was conducted for the CSIs of OPD. This course was created to assist individuals working in the forensics industry in comprehending the features of bloodstain patterns that can show whether a crime was committed. The main character of the television series "Dexter" performed this kind of work by analyzing blood traces to assist solve crimes.



COLD CASE: REGINA MAE

On June 18, 1985, at approximately 4:30 in the afternoon, Donna Armstrong, the victim's mother, returned to Semoran Terrance Apartments to pick up her two (2) daughters, Christina and Regina from the babysitter's apartment.



Christina told her mother they were approached by a strange man who tried to start a conversation with them, but he left after a few minutes and the children continued playing. The man returned around 3:00 pm, and this time he convinced 6-year-old Regina Mae to take a walk with him. Regina Mae never returned.

The suspect is a man in his 40s, who wore a plaid shirt and old blue jeans. He had a cut on his lip and stubble on his face.



On September 10, 1987, Regina Mae Armstrong's remains were located by the Oviedo Police Department.

REPORT A NON VIOLENT CRIME

Do you want to report a non-violent crime? The Orlando Police Department offers you the ability to report non-violent and property crimes, such as a theft or vehicle break in, online. These reports are used to understand crime patterns in our city and to help reduce overall crime. Check your eligibility:

YOU CAN REPORT THE FOLLOWING CRIMES ONLINE

- Theft
- Vehicle break in
- Vandalism
- Harassing phone calls (with an unknown caller)
- Lost Property

Many Property crime cases yield no physical evidence or fingerprints. To ensure law enforcement resources are used efficiently for our community, officers do not go to your location to collect evidence or fingerprints if you report using this service.

GATHER YOUR INFORMATION

Collect as much information as possible about your stolen property. Model numbers, serial numbers or any other way to identify your property are helpful. Visit orlando.gov/crime for more details.

WE'LL GET BACK TO YOU

You will receive a tracking number immediately after your report. Once we review your report, if it's accepted you will receive a case number within two business days. You can give the case number to your insurance company for claims.
