MBE DIVISION MANAGER INTRODUCTION



To the City Beautiful,

My staff and I are honored to hold positions in a division whose sole purpose is to work on behalf of minority and women-owned business enterprises. We have worked hard to meet the needs of MWBEs in our community through increased communication, resources and training opportunities. Along with Mayor Dyer's leadership, we have also seen an increased involvement in City contracts for our certified MWBEs.

During the 2023 Fiscal Year, MWBE subcontractors were paid \$17 million, while MWBE prime contractors received \$12 million. These payments totaled \$29 million. MWBE prime payments increased significantly from the previous year from \$9.6 million to \$12 million nearly an increase of 29%. The year over year increase in MWBE prime contracts were mostly in the Goods & Services category. I believe a bellwether of our program's success is seeing MWBEs expand their capacities and move to the next level. And of course, we continue to focus our attention on the program's primary goals, which include:

- Help MWBEs gain access to contracting opportunities with the City of Orlando.
- Reach minimum spend goals of 18% for MBEs and 6% for WBEs.
- Assist with the MWBE certification process, including offering a monthly workshop.
- Educate MWBEs about the process and value of certification.
- Hold outreach events that target specific scopes of work that currently lack MWBE participation.

Our division was able to host an outreach event dedicated to business development opportunities for MWBEs. We partnered with NAMC Central Florida and the Orlando Minority Business Development to put on the Technical Assistance Speed Dating Event. Along with business development services, firms met with the City's Procurement and Public Works Divisions.

This year, the City of Orlando introduced the RISE program partnership with CareerSource Central Florida. The goal is to ensure residents have equitable access to opportunities in education, training and coaching to measurably increase their employability.

I'm proud of all we did for FY 23 and furthermore, I'm proud of the lasting impact we've had for the last 40 years of this division.

RISE Employment and Training Program

This year the City of Orlando created the RISE Employment & Training Program. This initiative is in partnership with CareerSource Central Florida to provide equitable access to opportunities through various training programs and support services. The goal is to increase local Orlando residents' employability and/or put them on new career paths.

Shirley Walker-Hightower is the program manager for RISE. She has been involved from the start of the program and has seen the impacts made so far. "Initially, we were supposed to have three people from CareerSource work in the office to provide social services for RISE registrants but we now have five and it's been so helpful because we want the RISE office to be a one stop shop where registrants can receive as much as possible all in the same place instead of having to go from place to place", says Walker-Hightower. Before RISE, the City of Orlando created the BLUEPRINT that focused on placing local Parramore, homeless and ex-offenders on City-owned Venues construction projects.



The City hopes to broaden the type of opportunities offered with the BLUEPRINT for local residents with more training programs especially after COVID-19. CareerSource has connections to over 100 job and training programs. In addition, RISE offers a \$125 per week stipend to registrants to help cover transportation, housing and childcare while enrolled in a training program. So far 120 registrants have gone through RISE and eventually were employed.

Base Consultants

Saila Alath had been working at a large engineering firm for ten years. But as a young mother, she experienced challenges maintaining work-life balance. "It was a difficult and risky decision to leave my comfortable job and start a small business, but I had to take control of my life and be the change that I wanted to see in the industry," says Saila.

Sixteen years later, Saila and her partner Wendy Bonnett are still going strong with their business BASE Consultants. Today, Saila works on building designs and draftings, marketing and mentoring younger staff.

The initial plan was to start with small projects and work their way up to larger contracts but as it turns out, BASE Consultants was able to secure work with the Wizarding World of Harry Potter at Universal Studios within months of starting the business! During this period Laura Barbero-Buffa joined the firm as its third partner. Each of them bring different strengths to the business. "Wendy is our construction guru, Laura is our financial marketing chief and I'm more of a theoretical and mathematical person running models and designs," says Saila.

BASE Consultants has had the opportunity to work on the Dr. Phillips Center for the Performing Arts, Orlando International Airport, Orange County Convention Center and, of course, the City of Orlando. As a minority and woman owned small business, BASE faced a lot of challenges like access to capital, delayed payments and underestimation of capabilities. Saila believes the best way to overcome barriers is to produce the highest quality of work possible and demonstrate your company's talents. "We don't use the MWBE certification as crutch or entitlement, but we use it to get our foot in the door and gain access to greater opportunities", says Saila. The City of Orlando was the first certification BASE received.





It holds a special place for them and it's been incredibly rewarding for BASE to serve Central Florida and be a part of the transformation of downtown Orlando into today's city beautiful.





Monica's Comfort Foods

Monica McCullough would watch her grandmother cook and it would bring about a feeling of family and love. Later on, Monica would bring cookbooks to school and then eventually she would enjoy bringing dishes to co-workers. In 2012, she started selling meals and came to realize more and more that this was her passion. Monica finally decided to start her own catering company, Monica's Comfort Foods.

Monica is the owner, main chef, administrative lead and pretty much has her hands in anything related to her business. The challenges for Monica came from going through the process of starting her own business. "I didn't have a business mentor or someone I could look up to for guidance when I was starting out. I'm proud I was able to figure out everything on my own and I want to be that mentor for others that I wish I had," says Monica. Monica helps other small businesses like other vendors who can serve as bartenders or offer a service alongside her catering jobs.

Monica found out about the City of Orlando's MWBE Certification through another minority-woman owned business owner who encouraged her to apply. Monica wasn't sure whether it would be in her company's best interest to have certification as she never pictured herself working in a capacity with local governments. However, it truly turned out for the best.





In 2022, Monica's Comfort Foods was selected as a subcontractor for Leu Gardens catering. "That was the moment when I felt like there was no limited to what I could do!", says Monica. Monica would encourage any person, particularly minority and or women looking to start a business to build the foundation and have any necessary paperwork, licenses etc. in place at the start. "It may seem like more work but it's truly the best for your business and will show others that you are more than capable of providing work for them."







Mims Construction

Lynn Mims, President of Mims Construction remembers attending community meetings and workshops in anticipation of obtaining MWBE certification with the City of Orlando. What's more special is this was around the time the City of Orlando first launched MWBE certification. Mims Construction is still certified with the City of Orlando today and has been able to work on various projects with the City and throughout Central Florida.

Lynn's journey to Mims Construction began when she went to work for a family-friend part-time. She found that she was able to complete the ongoing projects and credits her strong work ethic and furthering her knowledge of the trade by attending construction classes. This was the groundwork for the creation of Mims Construction. "I was blessed with two incredible mentors - Johnie McGee and Jim Easton. Theu were not only a source of inspiration, but they also provided a blueprint for navigating challenges and achieving meaningful goals," says Lynn. The two mentors offered the perfect balance as Johnie helped with the construction, estimation and building side and Jim helped with the marketing and proposal submission side for the business. Having a network of peers in the industry has been crucial, especially for Lynn as a black woman in a predominantly white male industry over the past 35 years. Still with all of this, Lynn views challenges as invaluable learning opportunities allows to grow and evolve.

Mims Construction operates on projects in education, airports and infrastructure. Lynn has been able to witness how her projects directly impact communities and enhance the way people live. "Providing residents with safe sidewalks, replacing road and dirt paths has been fulfilling. It is also feels me with pride to contribute to educational projects, especially witnessing children enter a new school on campus






on their first day of school," says Lynn. In addition to all of this, Mimis Construction offers inhouse apprenticeship and on the job, training programs for students or for individuals with a criminal history. Lynn is able to do for others what her mentors did for you and provide people the skills and knowledge to grow in their professional and personal lives.






MWBE Certification Outcomes

In FY 2023 there were 544 MWBE firms certified with the City of Orlando. Of the 544 MWBE Firms, 382 (70%) were located within the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) and of those firms 80% are located in Orange County.










FY 2022-2023 Firms By Ethnicity

City of Orlando MWBE 2023 Spend


During FY 2023, a total of \$29 million in City of Orlando contracts was paid to MWBE firms. Of this total, \$12 million was paid to MWBE Prime Contractors and \$17 million was paid to MWBE subcontractors.




American Contract Compliance Association (ACCA) 2023 Training Institute


